THEIR MUSIC LIVES ON . . . ARTISTS WHO SHARED THEIR TALENTS ON OUR STAGES OVER THE YEARS



Toumani Diabaté

August 10, 1965 – July 19, 2024

Malian musician Toumani Diabaté was the undisputed master of the kora. Toumani was born in 1965 in Bamako, Mali into a family of griots. His first trip to London was in 1986, and, in the years since, he has recorded his own music and duets with the likes of Taj Mahal and Ali Farka Touré. Diabaté's role as *griot*—traditional West African musician-historians—can be traced back over 70 generations, and he dedicated his life to honouring the heritage of Mandé-speaking peoples across West Africa to share their rich history with the world. We were honoured to have Toumani play the Festival in 2007 with his Symmetric Orchestra. His departure leaves an immense void in our hearts, but his musical legacy will continue to resonate within us and inspire generations to come.



Bernice Reagon Johnson October 4, 1942 – July 16, 2024

"When we sing, we announce our existence."

Singer, band leader, social activist, and academic, Bernice Reagon Johnson was best known for performing with two influential singing ensembles: the 1960s protest group The Freedom Singers, which she co-founded, and the Grammy-nominated *a cappella* troupe Sweet Honey in the Rock. She went on to become a leading scholar of Black musical life. In 1989, she was awarded a genius grant from the MacArthur Foundation. In 1994, she created a 26-part NPR documentary called *Wade in the Water* that won a Peabody award. In 1995, she was awarded the Presidential Medal and the Charles Frankel Prize. Sweet Honey in the Rock performed several times in the festival's formative years and had a great impact on attendees.

STAFF, VOLUNTEERS AND GOOD FRIENDS OF THE FESTIVAL

Celia Brauer

1952 - September 11, 2024

Celia Brauer grew up in Montreal, a child of Holocaust survivors, her first childhood language was Yiddish. She truly loved the language and continued to speak it throughout her life. A music lover, she knew the lyrics and tunes of most songs from the late 60s and 70s. For a number of years, Celia coordinated and co-led the First Nations History Walks at the Festival that shared the Indigenous history of ?ə'yalməx^w / I'yalmexw Jericho Beach Park with festival goers. She will be sadly missed. Writes her daughter, Ilanna, "It has been incredibly heartwarming to see the many communities Celia was a part of come together . . . to celebrate her impact. Incredibly prolific, her accomplishments are almost too long to list as a writer, artist and community organizer. Most of all, we remember her for her dedication to *tikkun olam* (the re-



pair and improvement of the world) and her selfless and altruistic nature towards all inhabitants of the planet."



Pat Davitt

November 16, 1940 – July 17, 2024 Pat Davitt was known for her political activism, and artistic pursuits in her Commercial Drive neighbourhood and on Saturna Island. She took pleasure in cats, gardens, community arts, folk music, and friendship; she remained committed to justice her entire life, refusing to succumb to despair or cyn-

icism. She had two brief marriages but ultimately chose a single life. Her greatest talent was for lifelong friendships. In 1974, Pat bought a Victorian upright house in the Commercial Drive area with Maggie Benston, an SFU professor who had become her close friend, and they set about dividing the house into two living spaces and restoring its period features. Their house on William Street became a central spot for organizing, playing music, and neighbourhood activities. From their house they created the Euphoniously Feminist and Non-Performing Quintet, which often boasted either fewer or more than five members but never changed its name. Their house was a spot where meetings and parties could be held. They both volunteered at the Festival, and became friendly with visiting musicians. Every year, the Monday after the Festival would see anybody still in town gathering at Pat and Maggie's house to play music late into the night, spilling out onto the back porch and eating whatever food folks happened to bring. When Maggie died in 1991, her wake was just such a party.



Diane Smithers July 29, 1967 – March 28, 2025

Photographer Diane Smithers was much loved by the Vancouver arts and music community for her warmth, sensitivity, and keen eye, especially when capturing images of musicians in concert or off stage, taking photos of friends, family and her precious cats, Juliette and Jacques or sharing her vibrant and powerful images of nature.

Diane brought depth, nuance, life and spirit to her work. Born in New Westminster to Charles and Stella Smithers, Diane was the youngest of four children. She excelled at sports, especially softball and took English riding as a child, caring for her beloved palomino pony Cheyenne. She studied piano for seven years. She was close to getting her pilot's licence and trained with the RCMP but left to pursue other work, practising therapeutic touch Reiki and teaching yoga. She attended Carlton University in Ottawa and had been working towards a Master's degree. Diane's true passion was photography. She saw the intrinsic beauty, passion, and joy in the world and reflected it back in images. She has left behind countless photos that document her dedication and love for her wide community of artists, musicians, friends and family and for the earth. She is deeply missed.

Brooke Erickson

May 16, 1992 – December 9, 2024

Brooke Erickson was a valued VFMF volunteer with a decade of service who coordinated the Party Committee. Brooke was a vibrant, adventurous, and resilient spirit. She grew up in Manitoba and moved to Vancouver to study film and music. Her deep love of music extend-

ed to volunteering at festivals across Canada including Kelowna, Toronto, Victoria, and Vancouver. Brooke's love of music introduced her to countless people over the years, many of them from Vancouver, who became dear friends. Her passion for attending concerts and festivals took her across North America. Her unwavering kindness and ability to bring people together will forever be remembered by those whose lives she touched.



Joe Tannenbaum

The festival extended family lost one of its elders this spring when Joe Tannenbaum passed away. Joe went back many years in the life of the festival. He was a member of the audience, the volunteer organization and the board of directors. He served on

the board from 1989 to 1993. A decade ago, he was in the Street Team, last year he was part of the Office committee. He gave his smarts, his money, his time. We were part of many things that moved him, that he felt made the world a better place. Therapist, environmentalist, social activist, nature lover and much more, Joe was a staunch supporter of the festival for decades. He will be missed and remembered.



John Sullivan

A passionate advocate for equality, John Sullivan dedicated himself to serving many communities across Vancouver and was a devoted supporter of the arts. John served on the transportation volunteer team at VanFolkFest. He consistently put the well-being of our volunteers and festival-goers at the forefront, always acting with kindness and care. John volunteered at many art orga-

nizations in the city and was known for his wisdom and generosity, and was a natural mentor—offering guidance, support, and encouragement to all who needed it. The Festival, along with Vancouver's arts community, will deeply miss his unwavering dedication and commitment.

VOICES RISING: NEXT GEN WOMEN IN MUSIC AT VFMF

This year's festival lineup is peppered with some amazing female artists, artists who are reimagining the role of women, upending traditions, and blazing new musical paths along the way. Some are striding forward into unconventional roles, reinventing their music by revolutionizing how it is made and who makes it. Others are also guardians of culture and language, revitalizing ancient practice with contemporary energy. Artistically, they are on fire – these women are lit, and they are lighting up the road ahead.

The path delineated for women by traditional gender roles can be very narrow, in the arts and elsewhere. Tanzania's Zawose Queens reshaped their musical tradition by challenging the restrictions placed on the role of women. "What we are doing is very radical," **Pendo Zawose** says. "We're the first women in our family to do this and be at the front of our music. We were always discouraged. There are certain instruments that are specifically for men that women are not allowed to touch. So when I was younger, I was told: 'You're wasting your time, that's not a female instrument, stick to your female drum.' It discouraged me a lot. But doing this has definitely changed our standing within the family."

Vocalist/electric *awisha* player **Yousra Mansour** fronts Bab L' Bluz in what is traditionally a male role, switching up gender roles just as her group transforms genre

> by moving ancient Moroccan instruments and music forms into vibrant 21st century versions.



The Zawose Queens

Innovative cellist and composer **Cris Derksen** is creating an extraordinary 21st century hybrid music that melds her Cree roots with her classical training, with the Powwow drum as its centre. An advocate for diversity in classical music, Cris combines her Indigenous heritage with her classical training to create new forms that are truly original. "Using older classical tools with Powwow groups is a way I can express the intersections between the old and the new. It brings together both parts of who I am as a half-Cree, half-Mennonite classically trained cellist."

With her groundbreaking album *Inuktitut*, Inuk artist **Elisapie** strengthened Inuit language and culture by transforming familiar pop and rock songs into Inuktitut anthems. "Although they're not my songs, this album is probably my most personal album, because these are Inuit

stories. These are my stories, these are my family's stories, my cousins' stories," she says. "This is really not so much about the songs, but the emotions that we were able to feel through these songs."

When singer/songwriter **Emily Wurramara** became the first Indigenous woman to win the Best Adult Contemporary Album Australian Recording Industry Association award in 2024 she remembers "thinking about my grandmother – how she was born at a time when she was classified as flora and fauna; she wasn't considered a human. I was more so excited for her because my clan, Wurramara, is etched into history books. It makes me emotional and my heart swell with pride."

This year's festival also sees the revolutionary music of **Les Mamans du Congo**, **Krystle Dos Santos** bringing Black back to country music, the trailblazing guitar of **Sue Foley**, Haitian-Canadian sisters **Bel & Quinn** celebrating their foremothers in song, the eclectic art of **Jane Siberry**, and the singular road taken by **Ruthie Foster**.

These artists are forging pathways as they imbue old forms of music with fresh energy and new approaches, taking their music into the future with verve and *joie de vivre*. They are also blazing new trails for others to follow.

"We want to be an example," says The Zawose Queens' **Leah Zawose**. "There are so many other talented women, including in our family, who just don't have the opportunity. We want to support them."

Everyone wants to have a great weekend filled with the appreciation of great music, visiting with old friends and meeting new, relaxing, enjoying the park and beach, eating, doing a little shopping...

The Vancouver Folk Music Festival is committed to hosting just such an idyllic weekend for you, to creating a welcoming festival free from prejudice or discrimination. To that end, harassment or intimidation will not be tolerated.

REES

Vancouver Folk Music Festival has partnered with REES (Respect, Educate, Empower Survivors) to provide online reporting for unwanted sexualized behaviours and harassment. REES allows event-goers, performers, staff and volunteers to create a record of the incident and share it with event organizers.



REES also provides information about community-based resources such as sexual assault centres, healthcare and other support services. To report an incident, scan the QR code.

Tarps 'n' Turf

We love the little homesteads you create. Please use allowable sized tarps/blankets (10' x 10' max). Please be open to others walking across or sitting on your tarp if you aren't there – be open to sharing your homestead when you're not in residence. Artists don't want to play to a field of empty tarps.

At the end of each day, just pack everything away – tarps can't be left overnight. Tomorrow is another day to plant your flag and to stake your claim for a small piece of acreage on the grass anew! Remember to pick up any garbage or recyclables in your area for disposal in the appropriate receptacles.

Special Viewing Areas

We reserve special areas for individuals with disabilities and their attendants. These roped-off areas are located at the sides of day stages and on a raised platform at the Main Stage. Please help us keep these spaces clear for those who need them.

Rules for the Common Good

- Smoking anything in the festival park is prohibited by City ordinance.
- Please do not bring your own alcohol or controlled drugs on site. They are simply not allowed.
- Please enjoy alcoholic beverages responsibly. Any loud, aggressive or disorderly behaviour may result in removal from the site.
- Give pregnant women and children first access to toilets it's the kind thing to do.
- Please don't use toilets marked "Universal/Disabled Access/Wheelchair Only" unless you qualify. All toilets are gender neutral.
- Only service animals are allowed on site.
- Don't climb on the stage or sound equipment. Professional audio and video recording of performances is not permitted. For media: to set up interviews with artists and organizers, take photos at Main Stage, or shoot footage, check in at the Media Tent located near the East Stage.



There are many ways to enjoy the evening Main Stage – dancing, standing, sitting, or reclining on a blanket. We've got a space for everyone. Here's a map showing how we can share our common ground at Main Stage so that everyone can enjoy the music in their own way. Be a good neighbour, and be sure to keep the access path clear so that everyone everyone can enter and exit safely – without blocking anyone's view.



Get Up! Get Down!

Please follow on-site signage that makes it clear where you can dance without ruining the "down low zone" views for those sitting on the ground or on low chairs

DOWN LOW ZONE is for tarps/blankets & low chairs (up to 28" high, including legs up to 4"high) only.

DANCE ZONES are on the outside of the access paths – on both sides of the Down Low Zone – for those that want to move to the music. Please, no seating, tarps, blankets in this area.

HIGHER CHAIR ZONE is behind the access path.

ACCESSIBILITY VIEWING PLATFORM is raised and set midway back in the audience.

LIMITED PRIORITY VIEWING AREA is directly in front of the Main Stage, stage right.

ACCESS GATE

Located on the east side of ?əỷalməx^w / lýáİmexw Jericho Beach Park, at the end of West 2nd Avenue. Here you'll find:

- An easily accessible drop-off/pick-up area (access is via Point Grey Road through the parking lot for vehicles dropping off passengers on West 2nd Ave.) Pedestrians can access from the 4th Ave transit stop and proceed via the Fire Lane to the Access Gate.
- HandyDART service pick-ups and drop-offs. (For more information on this service, please call 778-452-2860 or visit www.translink.ca/rider-guide/transit-accessibility/handydart
- Limited designated parking for those with Provincial Access Parking Permits is located in the Service Lot at the end of Point Grey Road (first-come, first-served).
- Site maps with a list of Accessibility Services.
- An accessible washroom, located adjacent to the Access Gate.

ATTENDANT TICKET POLICY

People living with disability or mobility issues unable to attend without the help of an attendant can purchase a regular price ticket and bring an attendant at no charge^{*}.

ACCESS TENT

- The Access Tent provides a private and shaded rest area for personal care needs.
- The festival has a limited number of manual wheelchairs and two electric scooters for loan to guests with mobility issues or seniors, as well as a space to charge electric wheelchairs.
- A ramped Accessible Washroom is provided adjacent to the Access Tent as well as in other locations on site.

THROUGHOUT THE SITE

Priority viewing areas for people living with disabilities are available at all daytime stages – many of them shaded for additional comfort.

Seating is available for people living with disabilities and their attendant on a raised and covered platform located midway back stage right for the Evening Main Stage. Look for Accessibility Viewing Platform.

Additional chairs are available for those who require them in the reserved grass area in front of the raised platform.

An access corridor is provided across the Main Stage viewing area. (During evening performances access will be limited to between sets).

A limited priority viewing area is available at the front of the Flex Viewing area located at stage right of the Main Stage for evening performances.

Access corridors and ramped accessible washrooms are located on-site.

Sanitary hand-washing stations are located near each Accessible washroom.

Service animals are welcome.

Clean water stations are provided at locations throughout the site.

Accessibility Volunteers can also be found at each of the Access priority viewing areas and throughout the Festival grounds. Or ask an Accessibility Security volunteer.

ARTIST BIOS MAIN STAGE

BAB L' BLUZ FRANCE/MOROCCO

Bab L' Bluz is on a mission to reclaim the blues for North Africa, upending tradition in the process.

In a long-held musical culture where groups are led by men, Bab L' Bluz is fronted by a woman. "There are still times when we are confronted with outdated attitudes... which only makes me more determined to express everything I feel. I will not censor myself," says singer and band co-founder, Yousra Mansour.

With a name that means "door of the blues," Bab L' Bluz is breaking boundaries around both gender and genre. Founded in Marrakesh in 2018 by Mansour and French multiinstrumentalist Brice Bottin, the band plays electrified versions of ancient instruments like the North African *guembri* – a three-stringed bass-lute – to create potent, hypnotic music that blends in other influences including Algerian Chaabi, funk, American and desert blues. "Bab L' Bluz plays original material that, while definitely not fusion, merges different styles to make a whole," states Brice when describing their music. "There is also the fact we are led by an African-Moroccan woman – a symbol of our respect for equality in a field that for too long has been traditionally male."

Uncut Magazine says: "Fiery and exultant. Bab L' Bluz's sound, which fuses traditional Moroccan folk music with a strong, rhythmic drive – that of the Amazigh, Gnawa, Hassani and Houara peoples – to psych-blues, rock and funk in songs that address local socio-political issues."

Mansour: "We channel our huge range of influences into music that crosses borders and travels through time." You will want to witness this East meets West mashup. – EM

ELISAPIE TIOHTIÀ:KE / MONTREAL

"Sometimes [my songs] can be very beautiful, and fragile and quiet and then it could smash you in the face. I'm just trying to be honest with who I am." – *Elisapie*

Inuk singer-songwriter Elisapie creates deeply personal and highly expressive music that, at its core, reflects her commitment to preserving her homeland and her Indigenous language.

She grew up in Salluit, a small village in Nunavik above Quebec. Now based in Tiohtià:ke / Montreal, she is an established part of the city's vibrant folk and indie scene.

Drawing heavily on her Northern culture in her art and activism, Elisapie is committed to helping revitalize the thousand-year old Inuktitut language. In 2023, Elisapie released *Inuktitut*, covering ten classic rock and pop songs from the '60s to the '90s, all sung in her Inuktitut language. Her dreamy interpretation of timeless anthems such as "Time After Time", "Heart of Glass", and "Wild Horses" are steeped in bittersweet nostalgia. All translated by Elisapie, the songs provide a familiar sound bridge to introduce and preserve her language.

Elisapie gained new audiences this year with her contributions to the soundtrack

of CBC's comedy TV series, *North of North*. Already this summer she headlined the Montreal Jazz Festival and performed at the Smithsonian's National Museum for the American Indian. This spring, *Inuktitut* received the Adult Alternative Album of the Year award at the JUNO Awards ceremony, presented in Vancouver. She was recognized as the Contemporary Indigenous Artist of the Year in the awards last year.

Elisapie has also made a name for herself as a documentary

filmmaker and for producing the first Canada-wide broadcast TV show to celebrate the National Indigenous Peoples' Day, called *Le Grand Solstice*.

While staying firmly rooted in her Inuit heritage, Elisapie's art is shaped by contemporary influences and culture, that both honours and amplifies Indigenous identity and resilience. – ZQ

Sometimes you turn a corner in your hometown and run into unexpected and incredible global music.

Described as "Arabic music, from Iraqi folk to Egyptian radio music, lovingly reinterpreted by Vancouver's most creative musicians," Haram is a sterling example of the musical world on your doorstep. JUNO Awardwinner and Canadian *oud* virtuoso Grdina leads a tenpiece powerhouse Arabic/avant-garde ensemble from our very own city that will knock your socks off!

Starting with Arabic music from great composers like Farid Al-Atrache and Oum Kalsoum, Haram's music constantly shifts directions while building to euphoric crescendos. "The music's backbone is traditional, but wild outbursts of free improvisation and subtle

injections of noise make it quite unlike anything you'd hear in the shisha dens of Cairo or Baghdad." – Alex Varty, The Georgia Straight.

For Haram's first recording *Her Eyes Illuminate* from 2015, *The Vancouver Sun*'s Stuart Derdeyn said, "This is one of the best releases of its kind to ever come out of Vancouver's culture-blending music scene." Haram followed that up in 2022 with *Night's Quietest Hour* which, despite its name, does not diminish its energy or its abandon in a collaboration with skronk guitarist Marc Ribot! A Vancouver super-group of outstanding musicians, many of Haram's musicians have played the festival in the past – on their own and in other contexts.

Haram is Arabic for "forbidden" but when these players hit the stage, anything and everything is permitted! -ND

THE HEAVY HEAVY UNITED KINGDOM

With a nod to the classic era of folk-rock, Brighton, Englandbased band The Heavy Heavy create a sun-drenched sound that is rich with four-part harmonies, fuzzed-out guitar, and magnetic vocals – perfect music for a summer day in the park.

The Heavy Heavy "write and play music with that lick of madness that makes early Fleetwood Mac and peak Stones so thrilling" (*The Guardian*). They also conjure up comparisons to the '60s sounds of the Jefferson Airplane, The Band, and The Mamas & The Papas. Irresistibly infectious, their sunshine psychedelic pop rock is packed with a riot of colourful instrumentation, set on top of lush melodies and multi-part harmonies.

Georgie Fuller and William Turner formed The Heavy Heavy in 2019. The duo are from the historic town of Malvern, which Turner describes as "a beautiful place full of hippies and longhaired people." Taking up playing guitar in his early teens, he later played in a series of psychedelic/surf-rock bands. Fuller's background includes performing at Montreux Jazz Festival as a teenager and acting in the London theatre-scene.

They released their first EP, *Life and Life Only*, in late 2020 and made The NME 100: essential emerging artist list in 2023. *One of a Kind*, The Heavy Heavy's debut album, was released last year to rave reviews and they were named "one of the brightest new UK acts" by *FLOOD Magazine*.

The Heavy Heavy has been touring the world performing at prestigious festivals such as Bonnaroo, Boston Calling, and Newport Folk Festival. We're thrilled that Fuller, Turner, and their bandmates are coming to close out our festival's Main Stage for a retro-inspired beach party. – zQ

MARGARET GLASP ORK

Margaret Glaspy continues to establish herself as one of indie rock's most emotionally insightful and lyrically fearless voices. Hailed by The New York Times, NPR, Rolling Stone, and The New Yorker, she returns with The Sun Doesn't Think (ATO Records), a raw and resonant new EP that follows the critical acclaim of her 2023 full-length album Echo The Diamond.

Written while on tour in support of Echo The Diamond, the EP was sparked by the immediacy and connection Glaspy experienced with her audiences. "It made me want to bring more music to them and release records closer to their inception," she explains. That urgency and intimacy shape the heart of The Sun Doesn't Think, which was recorded in just a few days with engineer Mark Goodell at Joe's Garage.

Across five songs, Glaspy channels a wide range of influences from the gritty poetry of Tom Waits to the sonic edge of Kim Gordon. The lead single "24/7" explores how childhood beliefs linger into adulthood, subtly shaping our fears and behaviours. Other standout tracks like "Will You Be My Man" and "Bathtub" navigate themes of self-doubt, identity, and emotional recalibration with a stark vulnerability that feels both personal and universal.

Stripped back to just voice and guitar, The Sun Doesn't Think showcases Glaspy at her most unfiltered and evocative. It's a luminous, minimalist work that expands her already rich artistic palette while offering moments of clarity, curiosity, and escape. With this EP, Glaspy once again proves music's quiet power to transform reflection into revelation. - DS

Since Joey Ryan and Kenneth Pattengale formed The Milk Carton Kids in 2011, they have enjoyed a rapid ascension to the top of the indie folk world. Their 2013 record, Ash and Clay, received a Grammy nomination for Best Folk Album, and they were nominated for Group of the Year in 2014 by the Americana Music Association. Altogether, they have recorded seven albums, and many consider their 2023 release, I Only See The Moon, as amongst their very best. It's a perfect distillation of their music: two voices blended in spellbinding harmony, accompanied by subtly perfect acoustic instrumentation in support of some of the best songs in contemporary music.

With vocal arrangements that would make The Everly Brothers proud, it's not surprising that The Milk Carton Kids have caught the ears of some of roots music's finest performers. Over the years, they've collaborated with Roseanne Cash, Mumford and Sons, and Josh Ritter to create recordings that have elevated their sound and taken it in new directions.

Whether singing a hurting ballad about love gone wrong or expressing slow-burning outrage at the inequalities plaguing contemporary society, The

Milk Carton Kids never forget their sense of humour. With great playing, soaring vocals and a leave 'em laughing approach, the duo are an unforgettable live act that is very much at the top of their game!

OCIE ELLIOTT BRITISH COLUMBIA

Known for their intimate acoustic sound and heartfelt songwriting, Ocie Elliott creates music that explores themes of love, longing, and human connection. Jon Middleton and Sierra Lundy are a Canadian folk duo from Victoria, BC whose gentle harmonies and stripped-back arrangements offer a sense of warmth and introspection that has resonated with listeners around the world.

Since first emerging on the folk scene, Ocie Elliott has steadily built a loyal following, drawn to their emotional depth, quiet vulnerability, and undeniable chemistry. Their music has been featured in several popular television series, including *Grey's Anatomy*, *Batwoman*, and *Sweet Magnolias*, further cementing their presence in the broader musical landscape.

In 2022, the pair earned a JUNO Award nomination for Breakthrough Artist of the Year—a reflection of their growing influence in Canadian music. Their sound, both timeless and modern, continues to evolve with each release. By the end of 2024, they had released two full-length albums, seven EPs, and a number of singles, each one showcasing their ability to turn raw emotion into beautifully crafted songs.

Whether on stage or in the studio, Ocie Elliott brings a rare authenticity to their music. With songs rooted in simplicity, connection, and wonder, they invite listeners into a deeply personal, reflective world. Their work captures the power of quiet moments, offering a space to feel, to reflect, and to connect. – DS

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ON THE BEACH: NEIL YOUNG REIMAGINED BRITISH COLUMBIA

We'll be panning for gold this summer with On the Beach: Neil Young Reimagined!

The reimagining of songs from classic albums is an annual festival highlight and Neil Young's *After the Gold Rush* is the focus this year for a celebration of his music interpreted by a bumper crop of festival artists. Released in 1970, *After The Gold Rush* was recorded with members of both of his associated groups at the time, Crazy Horse and Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young. This breakthrough album set the template for Young's career, allowing him to shift back and forth between soft and hard, folk and rock, one foot firmly in the coffee shop scene of the '60s, the other in the rock arenas of the '70s.

Behind the scenes there is much preparation to these reimaginings – the artists pick their songs and coordinate with musical director Steve Dawson to ensure that there are no duplicates. Then they send in "demos" of a chorus or verse to get the key, tempo and feel of how they want to approach their choice. Dawson then works out the arrangements and prepares the house band – the legendary Hen House All-Stars – to support the artist's vision.

In addition to songs from *After the Gold Rush*, the performers also have some freedom to explore other favourites from Young's expansive songbook.

This year more than ever, we need to show that Canadians know how to keep on rockin' in the free world! -ND

RUTHIE FOSTER TEXAS

A singular artist whose performances mix true passion with contagious joy makes a welcome return to our stages this summer.

Ruthie Foster has been described by *Rolling Stone* as "pure magic to watch and hear" and by the *Austin*

American-Statesman as "a transcendent singer with uncommon power and emotion."

Raised in a family of gospel singers in rural Texas, she was a soloist in her community church by age 14. Her musical journey has since taken her far afield and back again to Texas, where she calls the music hub of Austin home. This longtime VFMF favourite remains rooted in tradition but her expressive and individual voice is not bound by a single genre of music.

Encompassing gospel, blues, folk, and country, her songs explore love, loss, and resilience. Her extraordinary live performances blow audiences away with her captivating presence and spellbinding voice – when Ruthie unleashes its power, well, if we had a roof at ?əỷalməx^w / lýálmexw Jericho Beach, her voice could blow it off!

After years of Grammy nominations, in February she won the award for Best Contemporary Blues Album for her recording *Mileage*, which was inspired by a remark made by her doctor. "I was talking with my doctor about age. I was talking about feeling old on that particular day. She whipped around and said, 'Oh, no, honey. It's not about that. You just have more mileage than most!'" says Ruthie.

Mileage is a celebration of her career as a Black woman and LGBTQ+ artist and is a testament to the power of authenticity and resilience in music, much like Ruthie herself. – EM

SHOOGLENIFTY SCOTLAND

With their "acid croft" fusion of lively Celtic tunes with the driving beats of dub and electronica, Shooglenifty has been revitalizing Scottish folk music and filling dance floors for over 30 years.

Originally formed in 1990 by musicians from the Scottish Highlands, Orkney Islands, and Edinburgh, this outfit has travelled the world, playing everywhere from small village community halls to huge festival stages. Shooglenifty describes their origin as a bright spark that "was the idea of fusing traditional and traditional-sounding melodies with the beats and basslines of a mixed bag of more contemporary influences." Guitarist Malcolm Crosbie came up with the name in the band's early days as buskers: shoogle is a Scottish word for to shake or move around, and nifty meaning dexterous.

The band's lineup changed with the passing of the charismatic fiddle player Angus Grant, but the music remains the same enticing mix of "hypno-folkedelic ambient trance" that drives audiences to dance.

The Independent wrote that their music "marries traditionally based tunes—primarily Scottish in style, but featuring a wealth of other world-music flavours—with the rhythmic energy, inventiveness and sophistication of contemporary dance music. Such a description, though, hardly begins to capture the dazzling multi-layered intricacy, exquisitely jewelled lyricism and intoxicating, coruscating grooves that are Shooglenifty's hallmarks."

After a long absence, Shooglenifty makes a welcome return to the festival—let the dancing begin! – ${\sf EM}$

Bringing a fresh take on their traditional music, The Zawose Queens are challenging a long-established form in vital ways by incorporating new influences and raising the profile of women artists.

TANZANIA

The music of the Wagogo or Gogo people of central Tanzania is percussion-driven with gorgeous vocal polyphonies, featuring traditional instruments like the thumb piano (illimba) that are often homemade. The Zawose Queens describe their iteration of this music as being connected to nature, and to ceremony and ritual, a "blend of the organic, harmonic and modernday electronic."

ZAWOSE QUEENS Pendo and Leah Zawose come from a dynasty of Gogo musicians. Pendo's father was Hukwe Zawose, an internationally known musician who recorded for Real World Records and played at the WOMAD Festival. Pendo joined her dad's band when she was 14 but as a woman, she was not permitted to sing lead vocals or play certain instruments. Now, with The Zawose Queens, she and her niece Leah are front and centre, showing generations-young and old-

that women can be the lead contributors in Gogo music.

"The role of women in our music had to evolve and we are part of the evolution. We decided we had to take it in our own hands," Pendo told Songlines Magazine. The Guardian wrote of the Queens and this historic shift: "The sheer vocal power of the duo is arresting, a shifting polyphony primarily addressing family and domestic affairs; this is the first time women in Gogo music have been allowed to write their own stories."

"The women were always in the background," Pendo says. "We would travel and perform with family members but the women have always been sidelined. This is an opportunity to be at the forefront, prove myself, and shine. - EM

AFRICAN CHAMBER MUSIC ENSEMBLE BRITISH COLUMBIA / ZIMBABWE

African Chamber Music Ensemble is an innovative musical initiative that reimagines African traditions through a classical lens, showcasing the continent's rich and reflective sonic heritage in a chamber music setting. Moving beyond the familiar rhythms and dance-driven styles often associated with African music, this project brings ancient and soulful traditions to new audiences—while challenging and expanding the traditional role of the Western string quartet.

The repertoire includes evocative *mbira* songs from Zimbabwe's Shona people and the intricate vocal music of Ghana's Ewe community. Performed by master artists Kurai Mubaiwa and Kwashie Kuwor, each piece is rooted in cultural authenticity and global artistry. Arrangements are by Curtis Andrews, a seasoned musician and ethnomusicologist with over two decades of experience studying and performing African music worldwide.

A skilled string quartet collaborates to reframe the quartet tradition through a decolonial lens. The African Chamber Music Ensemble invites listeners into a deeper, more inclusive musical conversation—celebrating ancestral sounds, contemporary excellence, and the transformative power of cross-cultural collaboration. – DS

BAMBA WASSOULOU GROOVE MALL

Founded in the West African music hub of Bamako in 2013, the Bamba Wassoulou Groove blast Malian music into the 21st century with their distinctive and infectious sound.

They carry on the legacy of the Super Djata Band, one of Mali's hottest groups of the 1980s, and the Super Rail Band, who were among the first groups to combine Afro-Cuban influences with electrified guitar-driven Manding music. This band builds on that foundation with swirling, snaking guitars that create a wall of sound. It's topped by the warm compelling voice of singer Ousmane Diaketé – a Malian incarnation of Otis Redding or Wilson Pickett. Joining them are two veterans of the Super Rail Band: ace drummer Maguett Diop and guitarist Moussa Diabaté, who stems from an age-old family line of *griot* music masters. Rounding out the group is rock-influenced guitar of Mamadou "Bainy" Diabaté and bassist Aboubacar "Papis" Diombana.

Described as "West African guitar playing at its finest" by *RootsWorld*, the Bamba Wassoulou Groove are one of the top practitioners of the unmistakable and irresistible, guitar-driven modern Malian sound: intense dance music! – EM

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Sisters Bélinda and Christina Bélice are the Montreal-based duo Bel & Quinn. Growing up in that city's Haitian community, their music combines jazz, rhythm & blues, and soul with the rhythms of Zouk from Martinique and compa from Haiti. Bel & Quinn's musical universe captivates with its beautiful arrangements and a sensitive trilingual poetic discourse which includes English, French, and Creole. Leading an all-women sextet, the sisters' voices blend in luscious harmony with Quinn contributing music composition and arrangement built around her jazzy guitar playing and Bel providing lyrics and percussion.

Their music is all about liberation and joy! The two sisters pay homage to their ancestors, to their mother and the women who walked before her, but also to themselves. Their themes of self-acceptance, mental health, and healing offer comfort and convey a message of hope. They celebrate both their cultural background and their musical gifts, while honouring both the strength and fragility of Black women in the modern world.

By embracing their collective voices, the duo stands out as leaders who will move and inspire! – ND

BLUE MOON MARQUEE BRITISH COLUMBIA

Blue Moon Marquee has a special kind of magic and natural appeal that exists completely outside of any prevailing musical trends. Formed in the early 2010s, this bluesy swing duo's joyous blend of jazz, jump jive, country, and Indigenous soul has attracted growing audiences around the country.

Composed of guitarist and singer A.W. Cardinal and bassist and drummer Jasmine Colette, Blue Moon Marquee started out as a kind of local secret. Their shows created a buzz from the get-go. They came out the gate, stomping and wailing their yearning brand of roots music with original songs that evoke dream collaborations between Ernest Tubb and Louis Prima, Memphis Minnie, and Screaming Jay Hawkins.

Blue Moon Marquee's music reflects contemporary concerns, giving expression to those left behind or rarely given a voice, smoothed over and brought home by the timeless grooves and melodies of their classic roots inspired music. The biting commentary, imbued with an easy humour creates a blend that unravels our deeply-held stresses and worries. The swing blues duo are expanding to a five-piece band to play the festival. – DH

CRIS DERKSEN

ONTARIO

Cris Derksen is a Two-Spirit Cree cellist and composer whose innovative oeuvre marries her Indigenous ancestry with her classical background, creating beautiful, genre-defying music. This performance marks Cris' return to the VFMF stage 20 years after her festival debut.

Hailing from Treaty 8 territory in Northern Alberta, Derksen describes her heritage as "coming from a lineage of chiefs from the North Tallcree Reserve on her father's side and strong Mennonite homesteaders on her mother's." This JUNO Awards-nominated artist has gained fame for her Orchestral Powwow project, which has the singers and drummers of the Chippewa Travellers at its centre with powwow drum as orchestra leader.

"One of the things I learned about making art is to take something you like and make it your own," she told *Musicworks Magazine*. "Contemporary and traditional have always been in my brain— incorporating the traditions of my Aboriginal heritage into the new contemporary schools that I play in. It's almost like being a jeweller making a bracelet—you're going to pick out the stones that speak to you. So I take all these influences and create the bracelet that only I can make, because it's my perception of the world." – EM

DEREK GRIPPER & GUY BUTTERY SOUTH AFRICA

South African guitarists Derek Gripper & Guy Buttery, longtime friends and musical collaborators, create music together unlike any guitar duo that you've ever heard.

Gripper has uniquely mastered the art of playing in the manner of the 21-string West African instrument, the *kora*. He travelled in India adapting Carnatic music to the guitar and then found inspiration in the complex syncopations of West African *kora* music. Having collaborated with well-known kora players like Toumani Diabaté and Ballaké Sissoko, classic *kora* compositions are now a regular part of his dazzling repertoire.

Buttery is an extraordinary multi-instrumentalist, lauded internationally for his insatiable appetite for experimenting with new sounds and instruments, underpinning his work's global appeal. In 2025, Buttery completed his long-standing project– the album *Orchestrations*—recorded across ten countries with contributions from artists that included Kaki King in New York, Mudassir Khan in New Delhi, Julian Sartorius in Berne, Madala Kunene in Durban, and Derek Gripper in Cape Town.

EILEN JEWELL IDAHO

Eilen Jewell's alt-country, roots-rock sensibility reveals a deep resilience that runs through her life and music. From Boise, Idaho, she's spent 20 years on the road, tracing a musical journey rich in discovery. Not only has Jewell shared the stage with the likes of Emmylou Harris, Wanda Jackson, Lucinda Williams, and Mavis Staples—she has continued their legacy with a sound that is soaked in the sway of western swing, an old-time twang of honky tonk, and dusty old-school blues.

American Songwriter described Eilen as "one of America's most intriguing, creative, and idiosyncratic voices." *NPR* declared that she has a "sweet and clear voice with a killer instinct lurking beneath the shiny surface."

Released in 2023, her ninth album *Get Behind the Wheel* is about grief, resilience, and redemption. It is based on her own personal experience of intense loss, trying to find a sense of purpose after a series of heartbreaks. She wrote it in a small cabin in the Idaho mountains, and she deftly captures her experience of isolation through her lyrics and melodies, producing some of the finest and rawest songs of her career so far. – zq

EMILY WURRAMARA ANINDILYAKWA

Warnindhilyagwa artist, activist, and songwriter Emily Wurramara is part of a new generation of Indigenous R&B musicians who are reclaiming their language and culture and presenting it to the world.

Writing and singing in both English and Anindilyakwa, her music mixes Pacific-blues, neo-soul, and indie folk with her expressive voice.

Originally from Groote Eylandt and Milyakburra/Bickerton Island, Emily is now based in lutruwita (Tasmania), the first Indigenous woman to win Best Adult Contemporary Album at the ARIA Awards in 2024, for her poignant second album *NARA*. Meaning "nothing" in Anindilyakwa, it references a devastating house fire in which she lost everything. The collection of songs is a deeply personal exploration of identity, resilience, and selfrealization to ultimately overcome hardship.

Since her debut *Black Smoke* EP (2016) and acclaimed album *Milyakburra* (2018), Emily has captivated audiences with her storytelling, amplifying Indigenous voices and narratives.

Emily has shared stages with legends like Midnight Oil and Mavis Staples and is joining us on the West Coast for her festival debut. Expect a performance that inspires and empowers through her music which is both timeless and urgently present. – Ds

JAKE XERXES FUSSELL NORTH CAROLINA

Making his VFMF debut, singer/guitarist Jake Xerxes Fussell is an artist whose inspiration comes from the music he was exposed to in his childhood in the American South. His deep affinity for traditional folk music, particularly Appalachian and Piedmont blues, comes naturally. Raised by a family of folklorists, Jake finds inspiration from the field recordings of forgotten songs made by his late friend

and mentor, Art Rosenbaum. His fifth album, When I'm Called, is a collection of songs with beautiful, poignant lyrics and melodies, giving a fresh take on a well established musical vernacular.

Jake calls himself a song interpreter. He mines old sources and texts, finding music that speaks to him personally and re-inventing it. Jake goes deep into the songs to conjure up emotions and channelling textures, music and musicians from the distant past. The songs he sings evoke things like memory, perception and loss; wistful, old-time music that speaks to us across boundaries of time and space. - AM

Jane Siberry is a beloved Canadian indie legend. She launched her decades-long career at 17, playing Toronto coffee houses in the late '70s and early '80s. Since then, Siberry has produced a string of iconic hits including "Mimi on the Beach", "Calling All Angels" (with k.d. lang), and "One More Colour", and 14 stellar studio albums in a span of genres of electronica, experimental, folk, pop, and rock. Collaborators are many and include k.d. lang, Peter Gabriel, Brian Eno, Mary Margaret O'Hara, and Ken Myhr.

Jane Siberry has continually pushed the boundaries of what it means to be an artist. She formed her own label, Sheeba Records, in 1996, focusing on self-produced small-scale tours and musical ventures. Her new album, *Season One: These Hard Knots* is a testament to her enduring creative spirit and commitment to making music that speaks from the heart.

Pure, hauntingly beautiful, a sound that is uniquely her own these are the words that get used to describe Jane Siberry. *Interview Magazine* called her "a superstar of the imagination with a passion for the truth." Jane makes her long awaited festival debut joined by Vancouver-based singer and actor Rebecca Jenkins. – AM

Calling Kirkwall in the Orkney Islands home, Kris Drever has been a leading light on the UK roots scene for well over a decade with a guitar style that blends traditional folk and flat picking with fingerstyle and more contemporary influences. Drever is also the vocalist and guitarist of the folk trio Lau, who played VFMF in 2008, the same year they won the Best Group at the BBC Folk Award, going on to receive that same award for the next two years running.

In 2016, Drever was named Folk Singer of the Year at the BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards, and the title track to his 2016 album *If Wishes Were Horses* landed him an award for Best Original Track.

This project, with Krystle Dos Santos and Mitch Smith, draws on the rich relationship between country and Black music. From the African origins of the banjo to Beyoncé's *Cowboy Carter*, it's an enduring connection.

Dos Santos and Smith put the band together in 2022 and have been building the buzz ever since with an EP and a sequence of good time singles including their crowd-pleasing favourite, "Canadian Party Song."

Krystle's original interest in forming the duo was about representation, "I thought it would be a great opportunity to sing and be in a band that played a style of music that I didn't get to perform very often. I also felt that it was a very cool opportunity as a Black female, to create representation in an area of the music industry that we are usually not seen. It feels good to get back to the Alberta roots I grew up in and sing this catchy and fun music."

THE LANGAN BAND SCOTLAND

Over the last 15 years, The Langan Band has crafted a distinctive sound that weaves trad themes, eastern European melodies, and sweet lyricism with hints of flamenco, punk abandon, and whisky dirges. Their songs are journeys, starting tentatively, picking up speed as melodies roll out, then completely changing direction at the roundabout where frenetic Roma melodies hydroplane into Latin bass lines.

This Scottish trio is fronted by Ayrshire-born John Langan whose expressive vocals, underpinned with a hint of roguishness, glide over melodic guitar as he keeps the beat with a foot percussion rig of his own devising. Violinist Alastair Caplin has a foot in the London prog-folk/jazz scenes, but his melodies are informed by the traditional music of his native Outer Hebrides. Angus-born Dave Tunstall holds up the bottom on double bass providing percussive plucking and ethereal bowing. When the three sing together the harmonies are tight and moving. Their songs are fresh, compelling, sometimes quirky, and always surprising. Get on board and expect the unexpected. – LP

LES MAMANS DU CONGO X RROBIN REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO



The dynamic collaboration of Les Mamans du Congo x Rrobin brings a wellspring of joy out of the fractured region of the Congo.

Les Mamans du Congo are a Congolese women's collective led by singer Gladys Samba, known as Mama Glad, performing alongside Rrobin-a French electronic music producer and beatmaker. The songs, sung in the Lari language, are a mixture of traditional lullabies and contemporary liberation anthems that blister with complex rhythms-played with found instruments by the Mamans including forks, plates, baskets, and recycled materials, underpinned by Rrobin's high-octane beats.

"The big purpose of the project is not just making music, the main purpose is to save matriarchal heritage and culture in the Congo. I realized all this culture, the songs, that the younger generation was about to lose it, because of modern culture. And mixing the ancestral tradition with electronic music allows the younger generation to re-appropriate it and this is having a big impact," says Mama Glad speaking to Afropop Worldwide. – EM

It's always a thrill when Samantha Parton drops by to play at the festival! Vancouverite Samantha first came to prominence as a founding member of award-winning Canadian alt-folk/bluegrass group The Be Good Tanyas. A singer/songwriter and multi-instrumentalist, Parton formed the group in the late '90s with Jolie Holland, eventually adding Frazey Ford and Trish Klein.

While on hiatus from The Tanyas in 2012, Parton was involved in two serious car accidents, which left her with injuries that made it difficult to play music. After being sidelined for several years, she reunited with former bandmate Jolie Holland in 2017, and they released *Wildflower Blues*, an album that wove together influences spanning jazz, blues, country, folk, rock, experimental, and the great history of American song into their distinctive original songs.

Since then, she's expressed her love for roots music by recording a gorgeous version of The Grateful Dead's "Attics of My Life", which led her to collaborate with Steve Dawson on his reimagining of the Grateful Dead's "American Beauty", and on our Saturday evening's *On the Beach: Neil Young Reimagined.*

When not creating music, Samantha can be found teaching songwriting workshops at Hollyhock where she continues to inspire a new generation of singers and songwriters. – DH

The '50s pioneering guitar/steel duo of Jimmy Bryant and Speedy West inspired both their music and their name! The dynamic guartet performs original music as well as classics from the West/Bryant songbook, Ernest Tubb & his Texas Troubadours, Hank Garland and many more.

Their melding of country, rockabilly, and jazz stretches the boundaries of country swing beyond anything Bob Wills ever imagined! They'll have you steelin' back to that same old used-to-be! - ND

The spirit of the blues lives on in Sue Foley! A veritable triple-threat of musical talent as a guitarist, songwriter, and vocalist, she is a multi-award-winning musician and one of the finest blues and roots artists working today. As with many blues women of the past, Foley has a long history of defying convention and being a positive role model for aspiring young women musicians.

On her latest release, One Guitar Woman, she decided to strip down her sound to a single guitar. Focusing on her intricate acoustic guitar picking, she shows another side of her artistry and pays tribute to her blues foremothers including Memphis Minnie, Geeshie Wiley, Mother Maybelle Carter, and Sister Rosetta Tharpe. This acclaimed release was nominated for both a Grammy and JUNO.

If you're a fan of the blues, Sue Foley is your woman - she definitely kicks axe! - ND

Blending traditional Japanese instruments, flute, and trombone with surf guitar, punk, Afrobeat, and art-rock influences, TEKE::TEKE create a frenetic and modern twist on 1960s-'70s psychedelic Japanese soundtracks. Their performances are described as unpredictable, high-energy, and intensely engaging, with Maya Kuroki's powerhouse vocal presence adding to the band's raw intensity.

The New Yorker praised their "spitfire songs" and "manic energy," emphasizing their ability to create a sound that feels both chaotic and cohesive.

TEKE::TEKE over time have somehow become tighter and more chaotic, more eclectic and yet more defined. Bouncing between dual-guitar riffs, hushed interludes, and cosmic jams, it's as if the septet shares a single mind—they've tapped into one weird wavelength, but there's no doubt they're all tuned in to the same frequency. - DS

VÍÍK NORWAY/DENMARK/SWEDEN

Folk noir meets Nordic roots with the Scandinavian ensemble VIIK. Singer, composer, and frontperson Elisabeth Vik enchants audiences with her recasting of medieval ballads and myths to create a power-folk sound with jazzy inflections.

Vik explains her inspiration with VÍÍK, "I wanted to dismantle my musical heritage and put it back together to reflect the globalized nature of myself and my generation. I felt a strong need to rebel against the cool, minimalist aesthetic of Nordic folk, and this firework of a band has enabled me to do just that."

The ensemble brings together musical talent from Norway, Denmark, and Sweden incorporating both traditional and

modern instruments. Hot off the release of their debut album in 2024, *SAGT* which stands for What's Been Said, the altfolk ensemble sets the stage ablaze with fiery energy and a rebellious spirit in their live performances. Experience a different realm where finely tuned Scandi-sound meets untamed, unrestrained power on the VFMF stage this summer. -ZQ

WILLI CARLISLE MISSOURI

Willi Carlisle is a poet, singer, storyteller, and dance caller who makes old time music for the modern world.

A self-described word wrangler, he grew up in a musical family—his dad was a polka musician—where he was raised on folk and bluegrass music. When he decided to do an MFA in poetry, he went to the University of Arkansas so he could also learn from the great banjo players around the area. He now plays acoustic guitar, banjo, fiddle, accordion, and harmonica, writing songs that veer from wild humour to profound pathos. *Indy Week* wrote: "Willi Carlisle is hilarious and heart-wrenching, bluntly profane and profusely kind" naming him "a shapeshifting bard for our times."

He views his artistic work through the lens of Woody Guthrie's statement that "a folksinger's job is to comfort disturbed people and disturb comfortable people" and as a way of being in service to people. "Folk music is social and it's political, and so we're always trying to sing anthems for things that we truly believe, even if they're impossible," says Carlisle. "Because demanding the impossible is what every successful populist movement has done." – EM

YE VAGABONDS IRELAND

Diarmuid and Brían Mac Gloinn are the alt-folk duo, Ye Vagabonds. The brothers are considered "at the fore of a new wave of Irish folk" (Irish Examiner), layering close harmonies over acoustic instruments that reimagine folk standards with evocative nods to the past that resonate deeply with audiences today.

Growing up, they began performing in the streets of their hometown Carlow, in the southeast of Ireland. After moving to Dublin in 2012, they quickly became a fixture in the folk music scene. Diarmuid and Brían's setlist of ballads, jigs, drinking songs, and reels are drawn from trad Irish, English and Scottish folk songs, mixed with American roots music and '60s folk revival songs, alongside their original compositions.

Ye Vagabonds has won multiple RTÉ Radio 1 Folk Awards. Taking their music around the world in recent years, Ye Vagabonds have collaborated with or opened for Patti Smith, boygenius, Phoebe Bridgers, Hozier, and Vampire Weekend. - zo
